

ICELAND'S REGIONAL AIRPORTS

Isavia operates four international airports; Keflavik Airport and Reykjavik Airport near the capital in the southwest of Iceland and Akureyri Airport and Egilsstadir Airport in the north and east part of the country.

Akureyri International Airport, located in North Iceland, is the gateway to the Arctic North. Egilsstadir International Airport is located in East Iceland and is the gateway to the magical east.

Both airports are open all year round and have daily flights to and from Reykjavik. Akureyri also has scheduled flights to Grímsey, an island located on the arctic circle in the north, as well as to two towns in the east: Thorshofn and Vopnafjörður. There are also weekly flights to Greenland from Akureyri. Both Akureyri Airport and Egilsstadir Airport offer good service and are especially well equipped for good winter service.

Travelers can enjoy numerous services at the airports at Akureyri and Egilsstadir, for example four international car rentals and a bistro for passengers offering snacks and drinks.





The region's salmon fishing rivers are among Iceland's best.





Husavik, a small town on the north coast is the Icelandic center for whale watching, where different whale species frequently enter the bay.
